Presidents Message

My oldest son Ben recently started reading bedtime stories to his younger brother. With one parent suddenly freed from this endless task, our evenings are calmer and I have the slightest bit more energy to attempt the rituals I imagine joyous Jewish families achieve regularly. I searched YouTube for Hashkeveinu, hit play, and watched our youngest son dance for the first time. Lay us down to sleep in peace, Adonai our G-d, and raise us up, our King, to life; spread over us the shelter of Your peace.

Sam swayed back and forth and eventually drifted to sleep while I thought about a sukkah of peace. A sukkah of peace is what I want for my children. Their lives should not be free from struggle, fear, pain, and sorrow, but I want my children to have peace in their hearts. I want them to be at peace with themselves, and use their self-assuredness to lift up those around them. I want them to draw strength and hope from the understanding that they are part of a 3,000 year old tradition and that their ancestors faced a frightening and uncertain future and did not let their hearts harden.

As the 25th anniversary of the assassination of Yitzak Rabin draws near, I have been listening to Shir LaShalom, Song of Peace. So go and sing a song of Shalom, don't whisper timid prayers. Go out and shout a song of Shalom, so everyone can hear...Don't just say "A day will come," go out and bring that day! This is an especially poignant message during the Days of Awe. Too often, I let my fear and anxiety manifest as cynicism instead of vulnerability, love, and work. This year, please join me in prayer and action to make peace a reality. Peace in our hearts and peace in the home. Peace in our country and peace among nations. Peace among all people and peace between humankind and all the world's creatures and natural resources. Let the sound of the shofar stake a claim on your imagination and be a reminder of the strength within us to bring that day.

Prayers for the New Year

We begin every year with repeated calls, liturgical reminders and actual horn blasts, to engage in an intensive cycle of introspection, t'shuvah. These calls to self-reflection cannot be relegated to a single month or two per year. What would it be like if we blew

off self-reflection, seeking forgiveness, and uncovering our true selves, for ten months of the year? We would lose our moral and individualistic bearings. Our relationships would deteriorate. Clearly we must seek a balance between worldly activity and this inner work. What does self-reflective engagement with the world look like? Of course, it looks different for every person, but perhaps the quality of relating or dialogue, is a necessary ingredient. When we maintain relations with our inner-selves, and/or G-d, we remain in the world while connected to something transcendent. There is a small voice within us that calls out when we have become unbalanced, and once again need to look inward. These small calls, quieter than the shofar, when heeded, can prompt us to return.

In my life I've spent long periods of time focused on my inner life, but at this point in my life, and perhaps this point in time historically, I feel pulled outward to engage. I am struggling between this need to engage more fully, and my natural tendency to focus inward. On Rosh Hashanah I offered some personal prayers for the coming year, as a salve for my nonacceptance of where we find ourselves right now. I'm returning again to these prayers, with a remembrance and rededication, to the reality I see in the world today, and inner balance...

I pray that all beings who suffer are relieved of suffering, have shelter and enough to eat.

I pray that all people for whom selfishness clouds their understanding, realizes our interdependence.

I pray that all people who seek to do harm to others, sees themselves in those they call other.

I pray those who seek to control their fellows who wish them no harm, will find humility.

I pray that all people who believe lies know the truth.

I pray our society fully awakens to and rectifies historical racial injustices.

I pray our society fully awakens to our ecological impact, and seeks to live in balance.

I pray for the sake of the next generation, that the darkness today is that of a womb, pregnant with new possibilities.

Please join me in praying for a better world, and a greater capacity of heart to embrace it.

Chanukah

Chanukah, "festival of lights," celebrated with a nightly menorah lighting, special prayers begins on *Thursday, December 10th*.

The most famous story about that rededication comes from our Talmud, where we read that, when the Maccabees walked into the Temple, they found only enough oil to light the *menorah* (lamp) for one day – but miraculously, that small amount of oil lasted for eight days, which is exactly how long it took to get new oil.

Today, our celebration of Hanukkah lasts eight days, in honor of the miracles that occurred so many years ago. We light eight candles on the hanukkiah (one candle the first night, two the second night, and so on) and we eat latkes (potato pancakes) and other foods fried in oil. We spin the dreidel, whose letters remind us "Nes Gadol Haya Sham," "A great miracle happened there." We give and receive chocolate gelt (coins) and often exchange gifts, too.

With every Hanukkah candle we light, we illumine the most important messages of all: that we must always work to find light in the darkness, and we must always work to keep the light of religious freedom burning for all people, for all time.


Temple Shalom's Foreign Policy Lecture Series Continues -

Beyond Imperialism, Exploring the Strategic Significance of Crimea to Russian Security

In September, Evan Shallcross helped the Temple Shalom community understand Russian foreign policy, in

particular, its decision to annex the Crimea. He led us in a wide ranging, interesting discussion of contemporary global affairs.

Evan Shallcross is a Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy currently assigned to the Surface Warfare Officers School in Newport, RI. He is pursuing a Master's degree in International Relations at Salve Regina. Rose Macarons



Rose Macarons is a small bakery founded by Chelsea Rose in 2016. Originally self-taught, she started baking in Virginia Beach when she got obsessed with the idea of making macarons—the elusive and often tricky almond flour and meringue based sandwich cookies that originated in France. After moving to Rhode Island with her Navy spouse, dog and new baby boy in 2018, her business evolved and she shared a kitchen space with Newport Cooks and a few other Rhode Island food businesses. In 2018 the business operated as a pre-order and mail-order, with local pick up or shipping across the US. In 2019, Rose Macarons regularly had a booth set up at the Aquidneck Growers market and Chelsea took classes at Johnson and Wales University in the Baking and Pastry Arts program.

Chelsea Rose and Temple Shalom congregant/Treasurer and local baking enthusiast Ellen Shallcross started working together in January of 2020 and have become an unstoppable macaron baking force! This summer, amidst the COVID-19 situation, Ellen connected Chelsea with Temple Shalom and they formed a partnership to license the Temple Shalom kitchen as a commissary kitchen with the state, and now Rose Macarons is licensed to operate out of Temple Shalom as well! While Ellen has to leave Rhode Island soon (Ellen is also a Navy spouse, and their family will be relocating by the end of this year), Chelsea looks forward to offer a variety of baked goods to the Temple Shalom community—including macarons and challah!

Chelsea hopes to offer classes to the public, have bakery pop-up sales, and provide treats for Temple Shalom events in this partnership.



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
